



## One Day Workshop: Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> September 2016

### **“Disappeared but not forgotten: the Chilean experience regarding the search, recovery and identification of victims of human rights violations occurred during Pinochet’s Dictatorship (1973-1990)”.**

We are delighted to welcome representatives from the Servicio Médico Legal of the Government of the Republic of Chile to present two sessions on their work.

The first session will be more general and open to a wider audience. It will take a more historical approach, trying to give the audience members a comprehensive picture about what happened in Chile, how the Chilean state has faced the issue of the disappeared and its debt to their families since 1990 until today.

The second session will be aimed at those practicing in forensic archaeology and anthropology. The session will be a more in depth examination of the forensic techniques that are used at the Servicio Médico Legal in Chile at the present and the lessons that have been gained through their application including both from a technical and also a transitional justice viewpoint.
