Consultation on Common Agricultural Policy Reform – Direct Payments to Farmers: Next Steps

The Common Agricultural Policy Reform – Direct Payments to Farmers: Next Steps

General

If A welcomes the reform of the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP) in relation to Direct Payments as a means 'better [to] reflect the public service that farmers provide' (paragraph 8 of the consultation document), thereby improving sustainability and strengthening the management and protection of the environment and, in particular, the historic environment.

This is consistent with Welsh Government's identification of the Culture and Heritage of Wales as one of the priority areas in its Programme for Government and reflects the importance of the historic environment throughout Wales.

Specific Questions

The answers below relate specifically to the historic environment.

8. Do you agree that a proportion of the direct payment should be dependent on environmental actions?

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Yes. Greening provisions can deliver real benefits for the environment including the historic environment. The historic environment should be clearly identified as an integral part of any such provisions.

9. What percentage should be governed this way?

If A supports the proposed figure of 30%. Ideally, the Institute would like to see a higher figure, but appreciates that the policy needs to balance competing considerations.

11. Do you think the Welsh Government should run a Small Farmer Scheme? Why?

Only if there was <u>no</u> exemption from cross compliance and from Greening. All farmers should be subject to the same requirements in this regard in the interests of environmental protection. Otherwise this would undermine some of the fundamental aims of Pillar 1.

19. Do you think that transferring funds to the RDP is a good use of the funds?

Yes, given the scope within the RDP (particularly through Glastir) to support the management and protection of the historic environment.
