Based on block release workshops combined with imaginative e-learning opportunities, the programme gives apprentices the chance to engage with the past, whilst understanding the landscapes and buildings around them. By developing the knowledge and skills required to interpret the historic environment effectively, this apprenticeship can enhance existing roles and prepare for exciting future responsibilities.

Welcoming applicants from anywhere in the country, the carefully scheduled workshops take place both in the heart of Somerset at one of the UK's best colleges and at Historic England's regional offices, where apprentices can benefit from particular expertise and equipment. Each inspirational workshop is delivered by heritage experts and linked by e-learning activities, such as webinars and video presentations.
